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The study was conducted for CNN via telephone by SSRS, an independent research company. Interviews were conducted from August 09, 2018 to August 12, 2018 among a sample of **1,002** respondents. The landline total respondents were **397** and there were **605** cell phone respondents. The margin of sampling error for total respondents is +/-3.9 at the 95% confidence level. The design effect is 1.59. More information about SSRS can be obtained by visiting www.ssrs.com. MORE ON METHODOLOGY

A total of 1,002 adults were interviewed by telephone nationwide by live interviewers calling both landline and cell phones. Interviews were conducted in English and Spanish. Among the entire sample, 33% described themselves as Democrats, 26% described themselves as Republicans, and 41% described themselves as independents or members of another party.

All respondents were asked questions concerning basic demographics, and the entire sample was weighted to reflect national Census figures for gender, race, age, education, region of country, and telephone usage.

Results for the full sample have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.9 percentage points. For the sample of 921 registered voters and adults who plan to register to vote before Election Day, it is +/- 4.1 percentage points.

Crosstabs on the following pages only include results for subgroups with enough unweighted cases to produce a sampling error of +/-8.5 percentage points or less once adjusted for design effect. Some subgroups represent too small a share of the national population to produce crosstabs with an acceptable sampling error. Interviews were conducted among these subgroups, but results for groups with a design-effect adjusted sampling error larger than +/-8.5 percentage points are not displayed and instead are denoted with "N/A".
